Welcome to the second 2020 edition of the CPOC newsletter. In this edition you will find an update on the work taking place along with other content we hope you find of interest.


COVID-19

The Centre for Perioperative Care (CPOC) Workstreams Update

Work has been progressing on a number of our workstreams. Below are some updates and you can find out more on the CPOC website.

Development of guidelines for people with diabetes undergoing surgery

CPOC is working with Diabetes UK on the development and implementation of guidelines for the perioperative care of people with diabetes. Due to the prioritisation of the workforce in light of

COVID-19 the work on the guidelines has been delayed but will recommence in June 2020. You can keep up-to-date on this work via the <u>CPOC website.</u>

Redevelopment of the National Safety Standards for Invasive Procedures (NatSSIPs)

CPOC has been asked by NHS Improvement to take on responsibility for the redevelopment of NatSSIPs. In light of COVID-19 the convening of a steering group has been delayed but we hope it will be up and running as soon as possible.
