

The Centre for Perioperative Care (CPOC) Workstreams Update

Work has been progressing on a number of our workstreams. Below are some updates and you can find out more on the CPOC website.

• Development of guidelines for people with diabetes undergoing surgery

CPOC is working with Diabetes UK on the development and implementation of guidelines for the perioperative care of people with diabetes. The working group has convened, including representatives from the UK Clinical Pharmacy Association, the RCoA, RCN, RCGP and RCSEng. The Clinical Leads are Professor Gerry Rayman and Dr Nicholas Levy.

 Redevelopment of the National Safety Standards for Invasive Procedures (NatSSIPs) CPOC has been asked by NHS Improvement to take on responsibility for the redevelopment of NatSSIPs. CPOC is perfectly placed to carry out this work as a truly multidisciplinary collaboration, and this is an ideal opportunity to ensure that NatSSIPs support clinicians and managers in providing high quality, safe and efficient care. Professor lain Moppett is leading the work and a steering group is being convened.

• Shared Decision Making (SDM)

CPOC is working in collaboration with the Academy of Medical Royal Colleges on the provision of SDM resources. Dr Ramai Santhirapala will be leading on this work and we will have an SDM resources section on the CPOC website up and running shortly.
