Improving the Quality of Patients Care: 6th NELA Annual Report

The 6th Annual National Emergency Laparotomy Audit (NELA) focusing on the care of over 24,800 NHS patients before, during and after emergency bowel surgery, has shown that enhanced patient care has successfully reduced the 30 day mortality rate from 11.8% in 2013 to 9.3% in 2019.

Improving the Quality of Patients Care: SORT Study

Some patients die after major surgery. Risk prediction tools can help shared decision making with the patient, aiding decisions on whether to operate, how to prepare and use of critical care. An international multi-centre prospective observational cohort study in 274 sites with 22,631 patients compared risk prediction with 30-day mortality. In 88.7% of cases clinicians exclusively used subjective assessment. The best predictions were from the SORT tool combined with clinical assessment. P-POSSUM Surgical Risk Scale, SRS and SORT all over-predicted risk, with SORT performing best.

The 10-question SORT model has been updated including clinician assessment and provides the most accurate means of predicting perioperative risk. Find out <u>more here.</u>

Supporting Our Workforce: Developing Advanced Practice in Perioperative Care

POPS (Perioperative medicine for Older Patients undergoing Surgery) at Guy's and St Thomas' recently ran a two-day course for nurses and AHPs who wish to specialise in perioperative care.

Running as a virtual classroom, 14 delegates from around the country learnt about a wide range of topics including frailty, multi-morbidity and cognitive disorders. These taught sessions are supported by an online module, learning outcomes and an advanced practice capability framework. The expectation is that the course will run at least twice a year, with a plan to link with local universities to obtain MSc/BSc credits for extra study.
