NHSE/I Publishes Delivery plan for tackling the COVID-19 backlog of elective care

As CPOC's evidence reviews show, the healthier someone is going into their operation, the lower the chance their operation will need to be cancelled on the day of surgery, the lower the chance of post-operative complications and the quicker and more successful their recovery. Cancellations and complications are bad for patients and dealing with these complications reduces NHS efficiency and value for money.

10% - 15% of patients undergoing operations experience complications which are often preventable. Improving the preparation of patients ahead of an operation by addressing health problems yields major benefits as do simple patient lifestyle changes. Up to 14% of patients regret undergoing surgery so it is vital that through shared decision making that clinicians and patients determine that surgery is the right intervention.

CPOC welcomes the proposals to:

- o Improve shared decision making between patients and clinicians to empower patients to make informed choices about their own care
- \circ The commitment to Personalised Care Plans, which will support patients prepare for surgery by giving support and guidance to achieve the best possible outcomes
- o Support safe, effective and timely discharge from hospital
- Perioperative Care Teams to help draw these strands together.
